## Memorable FujiFilm Airship Ride for 6 CLAS Members

Last fall, George Spyrou's Airship Management Services (AMS) and FujiFilm donated a "Ride-for-6" on the FujiFilm Skyship 600 to United Technologies to auction for the United Way. 6 of us CLAS members were lucky to win the bid for this ride of a lifetime. It is a unique opportunity to be able to ride in an airship in the United States.

On August 3<sup>rd</sup> at about 5:30AM (missing the NY commuter traffic) we arrived at historic Floyd Bennett Field south of Manhattan and a couple of miles SW of JFK. Floyd Bennett Field had been used for many historic recordbreaking flights but that's another story in itself. Now besides a sparsely appointed historical museum, a bird watching center, a training field for NYC street cleaners, and an RC airfield, it was being used as the launch site of the FujiFilm Airship.

When we arrived, the 200-foot Airship was moored on its mobile boom truck and rested on its tail wheel so it could rotate freely in the breeze. As we looked across the large concrete pad in the early dawn light, we were alone with the egrets, seagulls and the airship. The first person we saw was a crew person who was loading ballast into the doors on the side of the blimp. That didn't make a lot of sense to most of us until he told us that the dew on the blimp was drying and it would make the airship light enough to lift the back end off the ground.

We watched as more crew arrived and they prepared this ship for launch. We eventually counted a crew of at least 20 - all uniformly dressed in red shirts. The check-out included all the instrumentation checks, running the vectored fans on the back sides of the car all the way up to take off power and in all directions vertically down to the ground and up to the sky to lubricate the gearbox. Each fan was powered by a 255 HP turbo Porsche engine usually found in 911 SL sports cars. The crew checked and adjusted the pressure in the fore and aft ballonets and refueled the gasoline engines. I secretly appreciated that I only need a couple of crew to launch my own hot air balloon.

#### FujiFilm Airship Ride (Cont'd)

The original group of six included Erwin Dressel, Charlie Perreault, Kevin Brielmann, Kevin's wife, Annette, Kevin's son, Christopher, and Penny Christy. As an early Christmas present, Erwin had relinquished his seat to his son, Andy.








Once the airship was released from its mooring, it rose almost vertically to about 1000 feet with the help of the downward thrust of the vectored fans, and then we were free to "walk about the cabin." Mike Fitzpatrick and his co-pilot, Mike Dawson, gave each of us balloon pilots a chance in the right seat to pilot the blimp. Andy had the first opportunity to fly and flew it from south of Floyd Bennett past Coney Island and across the Verrazano Narrows Bridge. The view from the 10-passenger car was breathtaking on this beautiful morning. We had the best photo ops from the big open sliding windows of the airship's car. Traveling at about 35 mph with the fresh breeze in our faces was exhilarating.



Then Kevin Brielmann took the wheel and flew around the Statue of Liberty twice and back across the center of the Verrazano Narrows Bridge. I then had my turn as Kevin reluctantly gave up the wheel. I flew past Coney Island back to Floyd Bennett Field. It was like flying a whale and I was determined not to have it "porpoise" as I have seen some of the airships around Hartford do. The ground crew were there waiting and when Mike realized that we all hadn't had a chance to pilot, he had me turn the blimp around, cranking the wheel all the way to the left until my hand hit my knee. I was surprised that this "whale" responded really quickly and turned south again.

Charlie flew it to Coney Island and Annette flew it back to Floyd Bennett Field. Charlie's description was that it was like flying a school bus with four flat tires. Christopher took the right seat for pictures only and Mike landed the airship into the waiting hands of their 20-person crew. The crew held the handling lines until the airship was moored on its mast. We were all extremely appreciative of our good fortune to have this opportunity to experience the flight and be able to log almost a half an hour of airship time into our pilot logbooks.

On the day I landed, it would have been the birthday of one of her daughters. A couple days later, I took advantage of the winds to land once again in the same spot, this time, no tears, just a very happy landowner:>). Did I mention that the fresh blueberries she picked for us went well with the champagne?!

Was it fate that drew me and the other balloons in the past? I know this is one memory that will stay with me for a long time.

## International Balloon Festival (Cont'd)

The festival set attendance records for the 10 days with the high quality entertainers at the adjacent fairgrounds. We English speaking people couldn't see the humor in the wonderful French speaking comedians but all the locals really laughed. Grant Aiello and Kenny Shumate were uncharacteristically tame this year. They only pulled off one pie in Kenny's face.

Matt Dutkiewicz and Jim Regan went with their friends and crew for an afternoon of Laser Tag. They also went jet boating on the St. Lawrence up in Montreal. Many of us went on a sedate cruise boat from Old Montreal around the island to the amusement park by the World's Fair grounds and some of us sampled some bison burgers.

Many of us ate at Mannekin Pis in St. Jean more than once. This is as close to Belgium as you'll be for a while. Starched aprons and lace adorned the waitresses and the aroma of fresh coffees wafted through the restaurant. While we look out over the Richelieu River and watch the boats going down the canal on the way to the locks, we sipped rich coffee with whipped cream until our breakfast arrived. On the first visit we ordered piles of fruit on crepes with chocolate on the side. On the next visits, we ordered smaller just as delicious meals.

Jim Regan took some of the The Barn's local crew on his last flight and saw that indescribable look on the face of someone who was experiencing his or her first balloon ride. That was worth the whole festival for him.

We had one interesting evening flight where there was a mass ascension, so to speak. We were having a small competition with all balloons flying from the airport. We had taken off in quite dense layers of balloons. There was one pilot who had yo-yo'd his way up and down hitting a balloon on the way down, then a car, and the same balloon on the way up. Not the way to fly in a crowd. (The balloonmeister at the next pilot briefing warned us of climbing or dropping too fast in a crowd.) There was more excitement that evening. Some had drop-lined into neighborhoods. Some had flown high to get further east and back toward the airport. 12 had landed in a corn field along the same road and didn't get out of the field until 10 or 11PM. One of the bumblebees spent the night in another part of the same field.

Besides the special shapes, one of the more unusual balloons is the Dutch up-side-down Festo balloon. His field of view is quite limited and on occasion, uses communication from his companion balloon that is right side up.

There was a pair of bumblebees that were well orchestrated. They launched together, danced together, held hands, and kissed.
